Competencies:

At the end of this career oriented B1 Level CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) courses, course participants will be able to search longer texts for desired information and gather information from different texts or parts of the text to complete a specific task. They can understand simple technical information such as user manuals for everyday devices. Students can confidently discuss familiar routine issues as well as other matters within their own area of interest or profession. They can exchange, review and validate information, deal with less routine situations and explain why something is problematic. Furthermore, participants can understand lectures or speeches in their own area of expertise, if the topic is familiar and the presentation is uncomplicated. They can communicate information and thoughts on abstract as well as concrete topics, examine information and explain a problem with some precision or ask questions about it.

Written exam (120 minutes), oral assessment (B11: 5 minutes; B12: 20 minutes), Admission prerequisite: Active participation and 3 take-home exams (text production and exercises)

Content:

In the course, students practice equally the four skills speaking, writing, listening and reading. The topics relate to work (e.g. holding a conversation, understanding of advice for application or asking for information on the telephone). Further, speech acts link to the topic of business, technology and environment (e.g. understanding information about innovative technologies, expressing advantages and disadvantages of products, complaining about a product and speaking about purchasing decisions). Important are argumentation texts, the statement and the opinion speech are used in this context. The course will also teach language skills such as talking about plans and intentions, understanding information about historical events. The vocabulary required for the speech acts is trained in the same way as the required grammatical structures (syntax structures in arguments with: because, despite, etc.; subjunctive II, past tense and perfect, verbs with prepositions, etc.)

In addition, language courses are practices in the course, such as understanding forum comments, talking about city/country, understanding opinions about city rankings, understanding popular science short texts. course trains the vocabulary required for the speech actions in the same way as the required grammatical structures.)
